Social Justice Incomplete Patrick Lyra Lanier

In our rush to welcome targeted minority populations in need (as allies and/or targeted minorities) we are too often taught a social justice language that is finger-wagging, shaming, and asociological. We often blame an individual's personhood for implicit biases that are often learned socio-culturally--and that cannot be unlearned without direct, curious, deescalated, and two-way engagement.

Join us as Patrick Lyra Lanier MA/MFTI and LGBTQ+ Outreach Advocate at Pacific Pride Foundation explores the value of robustly explored bias, of engaging in direct conversation instead of higher-than-thou social justice politics rooted in the very abuse dynamics so many targeted minorities struggle to escape each day.

February 5: *Living Joy* Rev. Tamara Casanova Suzuki

Children's Exploration



This week in RE we continue our exploration of UU identity through the Star Wars lens. This week's lesson we begin to connect our UU seven principles to the force using *the colors of lightsabers*. Each principle will be associated with a different color lightsaber and we will be talking about the qualities of a given color and its association with a UU principle. This week we start with RED and the first principle of the inherent worth and dignity of all people. Please encourage your children to bring their padawan headbands (extras will be on hand) and their light sabers for training at the close of the lesson.

OWL (Our Whole Lives Sexuality Education) will be starting on Friday February 3rd and run through Sunday April 2nd. Our curricula kicks off with a shared meal between parents, youth and facilitators on Friday evening February 3rd. Then the evening will be dedicated to curricula sessions related to establishing trust, building agreements for our time together and an overview of basic anatomy and physiology followed by a sleepover for the youth-chaperoned by parents. We will have curricula sessions again on Saturday morning and Sunday afternoon as well. Please note that each Sunday we will be hosting the OWL classes in Fellowship Hall (unless otherwise noted) and that this is a confidential and safe space for youth. Please refrain from entering Fellowship Hall after 11:45am on Sundays.

Our Whole Lives

Sundays this winter from February to April we will once again be offering our comprehensive sexuality education program, **Our Whole Lives** (OWL) for 7th to 9th graders.

Our Whole Lives helps participants make informed and responsible decisions about their sexual health and behavior. It equips participants with accurate, age-appropriate information in six subject areas: human development, relationships, personal skills, sexual behavior, sexual health, and society and culture. Grounded in a holistic view of sexuality, **Our Whole Lives** provides not only facts about anatomy and human development, but helps participants to clarify their values, build interpersonal skills, and understand the spiritual, emotional, and social

aspects of sexuality.

Our Whole Lives uses approaches that work. The curricula are based on the Guidelines for Comprehensive Sexuality Education produced by the National Guidelines Task Force, a group of leading health, education, and sexuality professionals assembled by the Sexuality Information and Education Council of the United States (SIECUS).

Our Whole Lives covers topics and skills that both parents and students want to have available but schools are less likely to cover. The Kaiser Family Foundation has an interesting report on this subject called "Sex Education in America: A View from Inside the Nation's Classrooms." New national surveys are challenging the convention that Americans are reluctant to have sexual health issues taught in school, the surveys show that most parents, along with educators and students themselves, would expand sex education courses and curriculum.

- .. Up-to-date information and honest, age-appropriate answers to all participants' questions
- .. Activities to help participants clarify values and improve decision-making skills
- .. Effective group-building to create a safe and supportive peer group
- .. Education about sexual abuse, exploitation, and harassment
- .. Opportunities to critique media messages about gender and sexuality
- .. Acceptance of diversity
- .. Encouragement to act for justice
- .. A well-designed, teacher-friendly leaders' guide
- .. Parent orientation programs that affirm parents as the primary sexuality educators of their children

There will be a parent orientation meeting held this **Sunday January 22** from **11:30 am to 1:00 pm** in Fellowship Hall. Light refreshments will be served and childcare (for younger children) will be provided. (Please RSVP for childcare by Sunday, January 15).




