Dear ones,

Many of you know that I will be away on sabbatical leave in the month of July.

According to the Unitarian Universalist Minister's Association: "Sabbatical leave is an investment that the congregation... makes in the future of a ministry. The minister accrues one month of sabbatical leave each year ..."

Sabbatical leave provides time for ministers to step back from the 24/7 nature of serving our congregations and spend time resting and renewing for the work ahead. Some ministers choose to use part of the sabbatical time to travel, study, read, or engage in other forms of professional development.

After five years of serving as your minister, I am grateful to have the opportunity to take this month of sabbatical leave. ## **Volunteer Opportunities**


